

How to look after a Miptor

Miptors are funny little creatures that have red, blue and green spots everywhere except for their blue head. They have lump like horns that are also red, blue and green. A yellow crown is also on their heads.

Housing Miptors

Miptors originally from tropical rainforests, therefore needs to have a tank that is 45 degrees Celsius, and it is vitally important that you spray with water every two hours. The tank needs to be around 150cm long and 67cm wide. The floor needs to have soil and leaves all over the floor to make the Miptor feel like it is at home in the tropical rainforest. The tank will need cleaning twice a week.



Feeding Time!

Miptors enjoy fruits. They eat once in the morning, around 7am, and once in the evening around 5pm. The main fruits they like are mangoes, kiwi fruit, pineapples and bananas. They drink 250ml of water each day, therefore need a bowl that can hold that amount. They only drink when they eat, to help their food digest.



Handling Miptors

Holding Miptors correctly is essential. If they are not held properly, they can become vicious and bite you. If children are under the age of 10, they must be supervised as the children may be rough and noisy. If the Miptor is not handled properly, they may not want to be picked up again. Always make sure that you hold them under

the belly and not by the head or tail, as that can also make them become angry.

Keeping Miptors clean

Miptors need a bath around 10cm deep every week. Miptors have a bath in hot springs in the rainforest, and therefore are used to a bath. The bath needs to be hot, with no cold water. As Miptors are reptiles, they require a hot bath as they are cold blooded.

If Miptors are clean and healthy, they can live up to the age of 15 years old. If not cared for properly, they will not be able to survive, contributing to their species dying out and becoming extinct.
